SUMMARY OF ACCOUNTS 2014/15





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Introduction

The Summary of Accounts sets out the main revenue and capital financial activity during the financial year 2014/15. The revenue expenditure information in this publication excludes certain transactions relating to International Accounting Standards with a view to simplifying the presentation of accounts. These transactions do not affect the bottom line deficit of £2.103m met by a contribution from the General Reserve. The full published Statement of Accounts and auditor's opinion can

The Summary Financial Statements have not been subject to audit and are not covered by the audit opinion on the published statement of accounts.

Treasurer to the Police & Crime Commissioner for Essex and Chief Finance Officer of the Chief Constable Statement

The PCC is responsible for preparing and delivering the police and crime plan, setting the budgets and precepts along with holding the Chief Constable to account. The Chief Constable is responsible for the direction and control of all officers and staff within Essex police. A budget of £266.955m was set for 2014/15 by the Police & Crime Commissioner. This budget enabled the PCC's priorities to be addressed under the following key themes for 2014/15:

- Ensuring local solutions meet local problems
- Reducing domestic abuse & all hidden harms
- Supporting victims of crime
- Reducing youth offending and re-offending in general
- Tackling the consequences of alcohol and drugs abuse and mental health issues
- Improving road safety
- Improving crime prevention
- Increasing efficiency in policing through collaborative working and innovation

The Chief Constable's main priorities for 2014/15 were:

- Prevent and Reduce Crime and Harm
- Solve Crime and Bring Offenders to Justice
- Deliver Quality of Service that Promotes Satisfaction and Confidence in Policing

2014/15 was the last of a four year period (2011/12 to 2014/15) covered by the Government's first spending review. This required significant reductions across all public sector spending to address the national budget deficit. From 2011/12 to 2014/15, target savings of £42m were achieved for the first spending review. Further savings of £17m in 2014/15 and 2015/16 are also required to meet the Government's second Comprehensive Spending Review. The savings will include the continuing reduction in the number of police officers and police staff and a reduction in PSCO's. The contribution from general reserves for 2014/15 was higher than planned, at £2.103m. Essex Police spends £158.80 per head of population compared to a national average of £183.50; this equates to 13.5% less than the national average. Essex Police has 1.71 police officers per 1000 population; this is less than the national (1.88) average. The same is replicated for PCSOs. Essex Police has 0.14 PCSOs per 1000 population compared to the national average of 0.24.

The element of Council Tax that funds policing services in Essex remains one of the lowest in the country. The relatively low number of police officers and police staff was highlighted in the HMIC'Responding to Austerity' paper (2014). The report also commented on the fact that Essex has the lowest spend per capita nationally on non-pay costs.

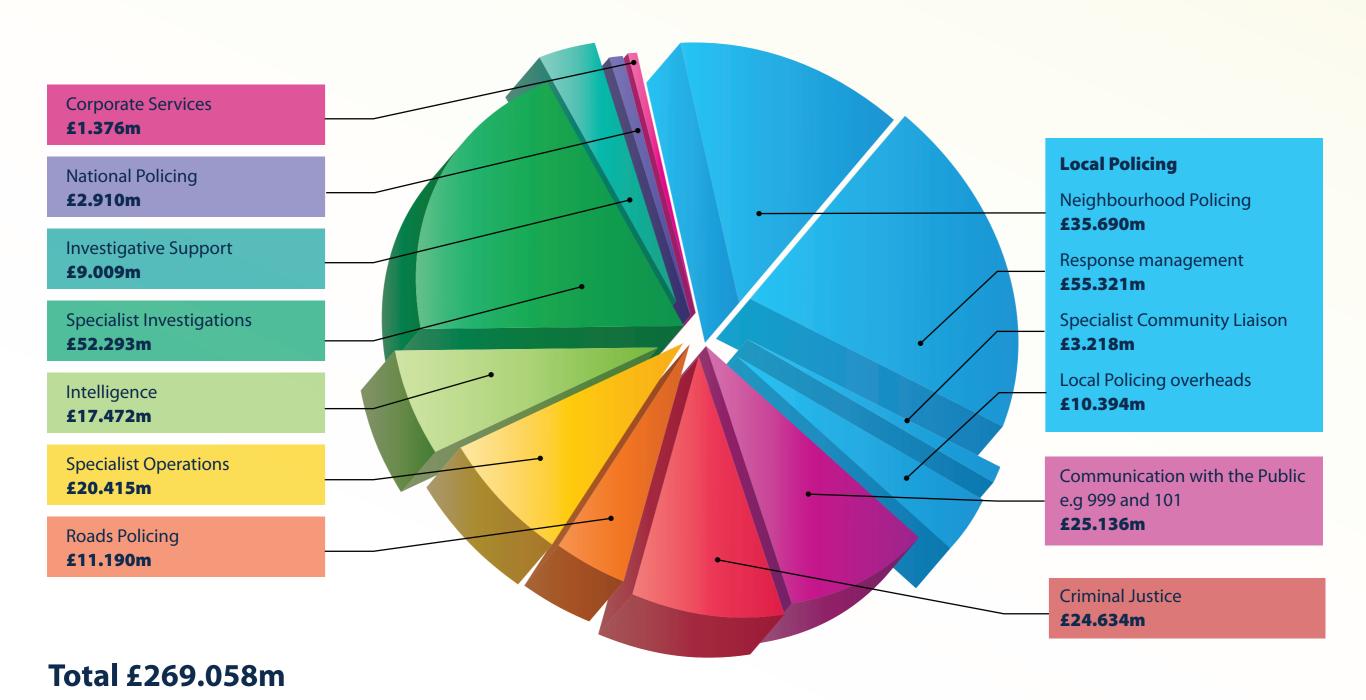

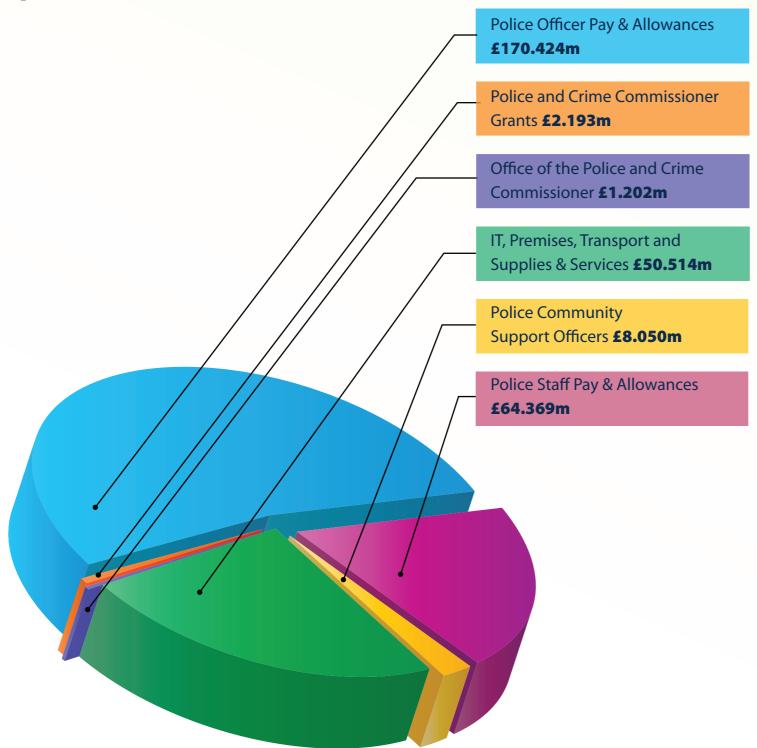
Amount spent on different policing services in 2014/15

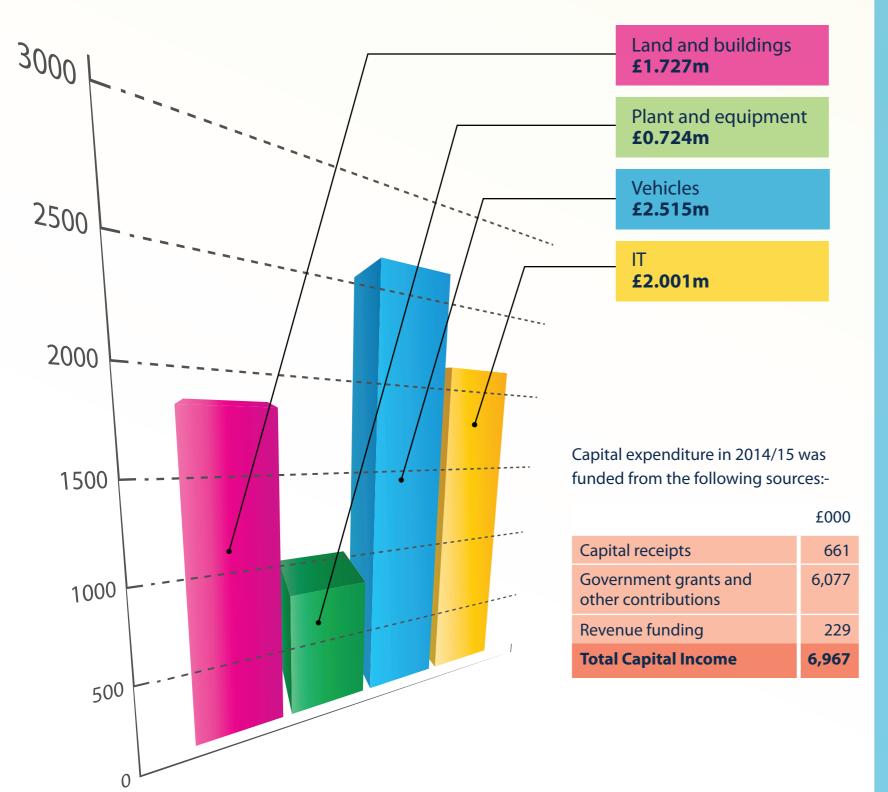
