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
Executive Summary

- Three of the seven PFCC Priorities for Essex Police have been given a recommended grade of "**Good**". Recommended grades have been determined with reference to comparisons with Essex Police's Most Similar Group (MSG) of forces, internal Key Performance Indicators (KPIs), and professional judgement.
- Four of the seven PFCC priorities 1 (More local, visible and accessible policing), 3 (Breaking the cycle of domestic abuse), 4 (Reverse the trend in serious violence) and 6 (Protecting children & vulnerable people) have been given a recommended grade of "Requires Improvement". None of these recommended grades have changed since the July 2019 report.
- All Crime has risen by 17.4% for the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018. Domestic Abuse (DA) has risen by 36.7%. The increase in both can, in part, be attributed to the increase seen in Stalking & Harassment following changes to Home Office Counting Rules (HOCR) in April 2018. Other analysis conducted by Essex Police also indicates that a more rigorous approach to Crime Data Accuracy (CDA), as well as an 'actual' increase in crime (offences not subject to CDA or changes to HOCR), are likely to be contributing to this rise.
- Essex Police solved 2,439 more crimes in the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018; this equates to an 11.5% increase. However, the All Crime solved rate continues to decline due to the increase in the number of crimes reported. The solved rate is currently 14.1%.
- Confidence in local policing (Essex Police internal survey) decreased significantly for the 12 months to June 2019 compared to the 12 months to June 2018 (65.6% June 2019 v. 68.9% June 2018). Confidence in the local police from the Crime Survey of England and Wales (CSEW) places Essex eighth (last) in its MSG, and 9.9% points below the MSG average.
- In the month of August 2019, three crime types experienced a statistically significant increase: Criminal Damage, Arson and Possession of Drugs. Arson has been a statistical exception every month since January 2019, when the Fire Service changed the way it reported fires that are started intentionally. Rape was not at exceptionally high levels in August 2019; it was a statistical exception in July 2019, and in three out of the four months preceding this.

Priority 1 - More local, visible and accessible policing

Essex experienced a 17.4% increase in All Crime (24,759 additional offences) for the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018. Essex is eighth in its Most Similar Group of forces (MSG) for both crime per 1,000 population and % change.

The increase in offences can, in part, be attributed to changes to Home Office Counting Rules in relation to Stalking & Harassment, as well as better Crime Data Accuracy (CDA). Of the forces in Essex's MSG that have been subject to HMICFRS Crime Data Integrity (CDI) Inspections, two have been graded as "Good", three as "Requires Improvement", and two as "Inadequate". While the results of Essex's recent HMICFRS CDI Inspection have not yet been published, Essex attained an overall recording rate of 95.8%; two forces who attained a grading of Good in previous Inspections had recording rates of 91.02% and 94.59%.



Confidence (Essex Police internal survey) is at 65.6% (results to the 12 months to June 2019). Compared to year ending June 2018, confidence in the local police has decreased significantly (deterioration of 3.3% points).

Confidence in the local police from the Crime Survey of England and Wales (CSEW) places Essex eighth in its MSG, and 9.9% points below the MSG average. However, the sample size from this survey is not representative at a sufficiently small scale to measure local issues. The Essex Police internal survey (results detailed above) was therefore introduced to achieve a more accurate local measure with a small margin of error. The results from the Essex Police survey show that the Force performs significantly better on confidence in local policing than the results from the CSEW, which asks the same question.

Due to the fact that Essex is 8th in its MSG for both crime per 1,000 population and for confidence in local police (CSEW), and the fact that the Essex Police internal survey shows a deterioration in confidence in local police, a grade of Requires Improvement is recommended.

Essex experienced an 11.6% reduction (5,667 fewer) in Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) incidents for the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018. Part of this decrease is due to better Crime Data Accuracy (CDA); more incidents reported as ASB are now being correctly recorded as crimes rather than as ASB. Some of the decrease may also be due to people reporting incidents directly to the Council and Housing Authorities.


ASB Perception (from the Crime Survey of England and Wales) in Essex experienced a 7.7% point decrease (improvement) and is 2.7% points better than the MSG average; this places Essex first in its Most Similar Group of forces. However, results of Essex's internal survey significantly decreased in relation to how well Essex and the organisations they work with deal with ASB (deterioration of 5.6% points).

Due to the reduction in ASB incidents, and the fact that ASB Perception is better than the MSG average, a grade of Good is recommended.


Priority 3 - Breaking the cycle of domestic abuse

Essex experienced a 10.7% increase (4,070 more) in Domestic Abuse incidents and a 17.8% increase (2,998 more) in repeat incidents of Domestic Abuse for the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018. The increase in crime, in part, can be attributed to better Crime Data Accuracy (CDA), and changes to Home Office Counting Rules (HOCR) in relation to Stalking & Harassment.


While the Domestic Abuse solved rate has fallen by 3.6% points to 11.2% during the same period, the number of offences solved has increased by 106 offences (3.4% more). The decrease in the solved rate is therefore due to the rise in offences being greater than the increase in the volume of offences that are being solved.


Due to the increase in repeat Domestic Abuse and the decrease in solved rate, a grade of Requires Improvement is recommended.

Priority 4 - Reverse the trend in serious violence


Essex saw a reduction of three Homicides (19 to 16 offences) for the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018. Essex is fifth in its Most Similar Group (MSG) of forces for offences per 1,000 population, and similar to the MSG average.


There was a 10.6% increase (1,455 more offences) in Violence with Injury. Essex is fourth in its MSG for offences per 1,000 population, and is slightly better than the MSG average. The increase in this offence is, in part, due to the rise in domestic abuse related Violence with Injury (17.9% increase, 795 more offences). 34.4% of Violence with Injury is domestic abuse-related.

Due to the fact that Essex is still seeing an increase in Violence with Injury, a grade of Requires Improvement is recommended.

Priority 5 - Tackle gangs and organised crime

53 Organised Crime Group (OCG) disruptions were conducted in Essex between January 2019 and August 2019. In January 2019 there was a change in the way in which the number of OCG disruptions were counted; this follows National Crime Agency (NCA) and Eastern Region Special Operations Unit (ERSOU) guidance to ensure that all forces record disruptions in the same way. Previous data periods are not directly comparable but are included for completeness.


Trafficking of drug arrests, which are also as a result of police proactivity, increased by 30.2% (412 more) for the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018. In the same period, there have also been 17.5% more trafficking of drugs offences recorded (123 more offences to 824).


Due to the increase in Trafficking of Drug Arrests, a grade of Good is recommended.

Priority 6 - Protecting children & vulnerable people




There was a 4.5% decrease (10 fewer) in the number of positive solved Child Abuse Outcomes in the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018.

There was also a 2.6% point decrease in the solved rate (from 7.2% to 4.6%). This is due both to a reduction in the number of solved outcomes, as well an increase in the number of offences recorded; 48.7% more offences (an additional 1,524) were recorded in the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018.

Due to the fall in the number of Child Abuse outcomes, and the reduction in the solved rate, a grade of Requires Improvement is recommended.

There was a 7.2% decrease (65 fewer) in the numbers of those Killed or Seriously Injured (KSI) in Essex for the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018. This places Essex sixth in its Most Similar Group (MSG) of forces for casualties per 100 million vehicle kilometres (results to June 2018).

There has been a 17.3% decrease in mobile phone crime (492 fewer offences) and a 40.3% increase (992 more offences) in drink/drug driving.

Due to the decrease in KSIs, a grade of Good is recommended. As of June 2018, Essex was slightly below the MSG average per 100 million km; however, due to the fact that more recent figures are not yet available, the current position cannot be included.

Monthly Performance Overview: Exceptions

Exceptions Overview

The following offence types experienced a statistically significant increase for the month of August: Criminal Damage, Arson and Possession of Drugs. Rape, which had previously featured as a statistical exception for four out of the preceding five months, is no longer at exceptionally high levels.

Criminal Damage

2.8% increase (430 additional offences) for the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018.

Arson

167.9% increase (838 additional offences) for the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018. The Force and seven districts saw a statistically exceptional increase in the month of August 2019. This increase is mainly due to a change in the process by which the Fire & Rescue Service report fires started intentionally to the police. Arson has been a statistical exception every month since January 2019, when the Fire Service changed the way it reported these types of fires to the police.

Possession of Drugs

62.3% increase (1,702 additional offences) for the 12 months to August 2019 compared to the 12 months to August 2018. The Force and seven districts saw a statistically exceptional increase in the month of August 2019. This increase may be attributed to the proactive use of Stop and Search operations, such as Operation SCEPTRE (although this operation targets knife crime, drugs are also found during the search).

- ² The confidence interval is the range +/- between where the survey result may lie. This is mainly influenced by the number of people answering the survey. The more people that answer the survey, the smaller the interval range.

- ⁴ Question from Essex Police's own confidence and perception survey (Question 8a). Results are for the period 12 months to June 2019 versus the 12 months to June 2018.
- ⁵ From January 2019, activity has been recorded rather than the number of people arrested. If there was a day of action, for example, and five people were arrested, this would formerly have counted as five disruptions, but now will count as one. The change stems from confusion over the previous guidelines, with police forces counting disruptions in different ways. The data are for January 2019 to August 2019. Previous data periods are not directly comparable but have been included for completeness.
- ⁶ Solved outcomes are crimes that result in: charge or summons, caution, crimes taken into consideration, fixed penalty notice, cannabis warning or community resolution.
- ⁷ 'Killed or Seriously Injured' (KSI) refers to all people killed or seriously injured on Essex's roads, regardless of whether any criminal offences were committed. 'Causing Death/Serious Injury by Dangerous/Inconsiderate Driving' offences (detailed on p.14) refers to the number of crimes of this type.

The CSS excludes proactively generated crime detection by police i.e. State Based Crime, as these offences do not reliably measure harms experienced by the population. Rather, they measure the resources invested in catching offenders.

Yr on Yr 3m %/% pt. diff. - compares the three months to August 2019 with the three months to August 2018.

2 Scare - Standard Score over 1.96 or under -1.96. Standard Scores are used to calculate the probability of an event occurring within a normal distribution; they are also used to compare two scores from different normal distributions (for example the number of offences per police District). In this document, Standard Scores are colculated in the following way: (current month's figure, minus the overage figure per month over the previous three years) divided by the Standard Deviation of the same three year period. Standard Deviation is a measure to determine how spread out figures are from the average or "mean" a large standard deviation indicates the data is widely spread; if small, the data will be more clustered together.

Please note that at the time the data for this report was extracted, 935 August 2019 records were still awaiting categorisation by the Crime Bureau; of these records, around 595 are likely to be crimes. These crimes would not be featured in the figures within this report.
