
Executive Summary

- Four of the seven PFCC Priorities for Essex Police have been given a recommended grade of 'Good'. Recommended grades have been determined with reference to comparisons with Essex Police's Most Similar Group (MSG) of forces, internal Key Performance Indicators (KPIs), and professional judgement.
- Three of the seven PFCC priorities 1 (More local, visible and accessible policing), 3 (Breaking the cycle of domestic abuse) and 4 (Tackling gangs and serious violence) have been given a recommended grade of 'Requires Improvement'.
- All Crime fell by 3.5% for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. This equates to 5,833 fewer offences.
- Essex Police recorded 247 fewer offences in the month of July 2020 compared to July 2019; this equates to a 1.7% reduction. In July 2020 fewer offences were recorded in every victim-based crime category, other than Violence with Injury (which experienced a statistically exceptional increase in July), Violence without Injury, Stalking & Harassment and Other Sexual Offences compared to July 2019.
- The number of crimes recorded by Essex Police has reduced since the introduction of the Government's restrictions on gathering and movement in relation to COVID-19 were introduced compared to the period of no intervention. 8.7% fewer offences have been recorded since the Government's restrictions were eased to allow the public to meet in groups of up to two households, and additional businesses including pubs were permitted to reopen (4 July 2020 to 31 July 2020 inclusive compared to the same period in 2019); this equates to around 44 fewer offences per day. By contrast, 25.1% fewer offences were recorded when the full restrictions were in place (24 March 2020 to 12 May compared to the same period in 2019); this equates to around 118 fewer offences per day. Each change in the rules relating to social distancing has affected the number of All Crime offences reported to Essex Police.*
- The number of anti-social behaviour (ASB) incidents was 20.2% higher in July 2020 compared to July 2019 (834 more incidents); by way of comparison, there were 31.2% more incidents in June 2020 compared to June 2019, and 47.8% more in May 2020 compared to May 2019. The increase in reports of ASB is due to the Government's social distancing restrictions that were implemented on 23 March 2020; many reports relate to activities that were previously not considered to be anti-social behaviour, for example social gatherings, as well as shops and businesses continuing to trade.
- Confidence (Essex Police internal survey) is at 65.6% (results to the 12 months to March 2020). Compared to year ending March 2019, confidence in the local police decreased (deterioration of 1.1% points). Confidence in the local police from the Crime Survey of England and Wales (CSEW) places Essex eighth in its MSG, and 6.5% points below the MSG average.

Essex experienced a 3.5% decrease in All Crime (5,833 fewer offences) for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. Essex is eighth in its Most Similar Group of forces (MSG) for crime per 1,000 population.

The number of crimes recorded daily by Essex Police has reduced since the introduction of the Government's restrictions on gathering and movement in relation to COVID-19, compared to the period of no intervention. A breakdown showing the affect of these changes can be seen on pages 13 and 14.

Essex was graded as Outstanding in its recent HMICFRS Crime Data Integrity (CDI) inspection. Essex Police is only the third force of the 41 that have been inspected judged as outstanding on the first visit in this inspection programme.

Confidence (Essex Police internal survey) is at 65.6% (results to the 12 months to March 2020). Compared to year ending March 2019, confidence in the local police has decreased (deterioration of 1.1% points). Confidence in the local police from the Crime Survey of England and Wales (CSEW) places Essex eighth in its MSG, and 6.5% points below the Most Similar Group of Forces (MSG) average. However, the sample size from this survey is not representative at a sufficiently small scale to measure local level results. The Essex Police internal survey (results detailed above) was therefore introduced to achieve a more accurate local measure with only a small margin of error. The results from the Essex Police survey show that the Force performs significantly better on confidence in local policing than the results from the CSEW, which asks the same question.

The All Crime Harm (Crime Severity) Score* (13.1) places Essex eighth (last) in its MSG.

Essex Police performance in relation to emergency response attendance within 15 minutes (urban) or 20 minutes (rural) remains below the 80% target for the 12 months to July 2020. However, performance improved by 4.2 percentage points when compared to the 12 months to July 2019.


Due to the fact that Essex is 8th in its MSG for all comparable metrics, that the emergency response grade of service remains below target, and that the Essex Police internal survey shows a deterioration in confidence in local police, a grade of Requires Improvement is recommended.

Essex experienced a 7.4% increase (3,234 more) in Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) incidents for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. ASB increased by 20.2% in July 2020 compared to July 2020 (834 more incidents): this is due to the Government's social distancing restrictions that were implemented on 23 March 2020 (many of these additional reports relate to activities that were previously not considered to be ASB, for example social gatherings, as well as shops and businesses continuing to trade).


ASB Perception (from the Crime Survey of England and Wales) in Essex experienced a 1.0% point increase (decline). Essex is 0.5% points better than the MSG average; this places Essex fourth in its Most Similar Group of forces. The results of Essex's internal survey in relation to how well residents perceive Essex Police and partner organisations to be dealing with ASB showed an improvement of 1.8% points.

Due to the fact that ASB Perception is better than the MSG average, a grade of Good is recommended.

Essex experienced a 2.6% increase (1,083 more) in Domestic Abuse incidents and a 3.3% increase (641 more) in repeat incidents of Domestic Abuse for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. However, there was an 11.1% increase (1,319 more) in Domestic Abuse arrests and a 26.2% increase (45 more) in Domestic Violence Protection Notices (DVPN) and Protection Orders (DVPO) in the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019.


There was a 5.9% increase (191 more) in the number of solved Domestic Abuse outcomes in the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019.


Due to the increase in repeat incidents and the decrease in the High and Medium Risk solved volume, a grade of Requires Improvement is recommended.

Priority 4 – Tackling gangs and serious violence

Essex saw an increase of 45 Homicides (to 61 offences) for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. This includes the tragic incident where 39 Vietnamese nationals were discovered in a lorry trailer in Grays in October 2019. Essex is eighth in its Most Similar Group (MSG) of forces for offences per 1,000 population, and is higher than the MSG average.

There was a 2.8% decrease (423 fewer offences) in Violence with Injury. Essex is fourth in its MSG for offences per 1,000 population, and is slightly better than the MSG average. Despite this decrease there is a rise in domestic abuse related Violence with Injury (11.8% increase, 604 more offences); 39.3% of Violence with Injury is domestic abuse-related.

The combined harm (Crime Severity) score* (7.7) for Violence with Injury, Rape, Other Sexual Offences and Robbery of Personal Property places Essex eighth in its Most Similar Group of Forces (MSG).

There was a 4.1% decrease (127 fewer) in the number of solved Violence with Injury, Rape, Other Sexual Offences and Robbery of Personal Property offences in the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. This is being driven by a decrease in the numbers of Violence with Injury investigations that were solved (see page 18 for the numbers of solved for each category).

There was a 99.6% increase (1,864 more) in the number of stop and search for weapons in the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. This is a result of both increased police proactivity and improvements in technology.


There was a 67.7% increase (559 more) in the number of Knife-enabled crime offences in the 12 months to July 2020** compared to the 12 months to July 2019.


Due to the fact that Essex is above the MSG average for high harm offences, and the number of solved Violence with Injury offences has decreased, a grade of Requires Improvement is recommended.

Please note:

- * Crime Severity Scores (as calculated by the Office for National Statistics) measure the 'relative harm' of crimes by taking into account both their volume and their severity. Data are for the 12 months to May 2020.
- ** The number of knife crime offences is an indicator of how effective Essex Police is at identifying knife-enabled offences, and is not necessarily reflective of the number of these offences that have been committed in the county. This is because the identification of these offences is reliant on the appropriate indicator being manually added to the crime record. A manual review of knife flags was conducted and missing flags were added retrospectively. Additionally a new data quality process was introduced in June 2020. Whilst this has enabled us to better understand knife crime in Essex, the process has consequently inflated the figures. As such, no inferences can be drawn as to the current trend.

72 Organised Crime Group (OCG) disruptions were conducted in Essex in January to July 2020* inclusive compared with 47 in the same months in 2019 (25 more). In January 2019 there was a change in the way in which the number of OCG disruptions were counted; this follows National Crime Agency (NCA) and Eastern Region Special Operations Unit (ERSOU) guidance to ensure that all forces record disruptions in the same way. Year-on-year comparisons can only therefore be made from January 2020.


Trafficking of drug arrests, which are also as a result of police proactivity, increased by 19.1% (316 more) for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. In the same period, 36.4% more trafficking of drugs offences have been recorded (286 more offences to 1,071).


Due to the increase in OCG disruptions and Trafficking of Drug Arrests, a grade of Good is recommended.



Although there was a 5.7% decrease (121 fewer) in the number of Child Sexual Abuse/Exploitation investigations in the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019 there was a 65.5% increase (150 more) in the number of solved Child Abuse Outcomes in the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019.

18.6% more Child Abuse offences (an additional 842) were recorded in the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. There was a 2.0% point increase in the solved rate (from 5.1% to 7.1%).


31 Modern Slavery referrals were made in April to July 2020* compared with 45 in the same months in 2019 (14 fewer).

As the number of Child Abuse investigations solved each month has been consistently higher than the volumes recorded in the same month the previous year (since September 2019), a grade of Good is recommended.

There was a 9.7% decrease (85 fewer) in the numbers of those Killed or Seriously Injured (KSI) in Essex for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. Please note that most KSIs do not result in criminal offences (such as death or serious injury caused by dangerous driving) being recorded. Essex is placed fifth in its Most Similar Group (MSG) of forces for casualties per 100 million vehicle kilometres (results to June 2019).

There has been a 71.2% decrease in mobile phone crime (1,769 fewer offences) but a 24.5% increase (833 more offences) in drink/drug driving. Both metrics are a measure of police proactivity in relation to road safety.

As of June 2019, Essex was slightly worse than the MSG average per 100 million km. However, due to the fact that more recent national figures have not been released, the current position cannot be determined (the date of the next national release has not yet been confirmed). Due to the decrease in KSIs by almost 10% in the past 12 months, however, a grade of Good is recommended.

Monthly Performance Overview: Exceptions

Exceptions Overview

Due to the government lockdown and social distancing restrictions that were implemented on 23 March 2020 the following offence types experienced statistically significant changes for the month of July 2020.

Violence with Injury – Increase

2.8% decrease (423 fewer offences) for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. There were statistically exceptional increases in three Districts in July 2020.

Burglary Business and Community – Decrease

30.6% decrease (998 fewer offences) for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. There were statistically exceptional decreases in two Districts in July 2020.

Racial/Religiously Aggravated Offences - Increase

12.1% increase (181 more offences) for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. There were statistically exceptional increases in five Districts in July 2020.

Hate Crime HO Definition - Increase

13.7% increase (382 more offences) for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. The Force saw a statistically exceptional increase in July 2020.

Public Order - Increase

8.6% increase (1,222 more offences) for the 12 months to July 2020 compared to the 12 months to July 2019. There were statistically exceptional increases in seven Districts in July 2020.

58 new officers join Essex Police

Essex Police currently have 3,306 police officers and are on-track to recruiting their target of 3,369 officers by 31st March 2021. In addition, Essex Police have more than 500 Special Constables, making Essex the second largest Special Constabulary in the UK. In July 2020, 262 people applied to work as Police Officers and 86 applied to be Special Constables.

Town Centre Teams: a year of achievements

In July 2019, Essex Police launched Town Centre Teams to make towns and communities safer. Working with the local communities they have increased the amount of information and intelligence received, enabling them to get to the root of ongoing local issues and tensions so they can investigate and solve them appropriately. The teams have quickly become part of their communities, which are coming together to fight crime and anti-social behaviour, making town centres safer for all those who live, work or visit Essex.

Since the start of COVID-19 in March, Town Centre Teams have carried out extra patrols to help make sure closed businesses are secured and, since last month, have worked in partnership with businesses and local councils to support them as they reopen.

Increasing our investment in our communities: CSEOs

As the Force continues to grow Essex Police have continued to invest in more officers dedicated to local policing. 20 new Community Safety Engagement Officers (CSEOs), who support their local policing teams alongside Town Centre Teams, started to move into their posts during July 2020. CSEOs will work closely with existing community PCs and PCSOs and with community safety partners to reduce crime and anti-social behaviour, protecting vulnerable people and looking at longer-term problem-solving and the outcomes of work from community priorities.

Millions in cash and drugs seized in major operation

More than £21 million worth of Class A drugs and £1.85 million in cash have been seized in Essex by the Force's Serious Crime Directorate as part of an international operation targeting serious and organised crime. A total of 155.5kg of Class A drugs was recovered during activity since 1st May which has also seen 13 people arrested. The seizures are the result of hard work and dedication from SOCU, (Serious, Organised and Cross-border Crime Unit), Intel, Surveillance, the Technical Support Unit and OSG (Operational Support Group).

A manual review of knife flags was conducted and missing flags were added retrospectively. Additionally a new data quality process was introduced in June 2020. Whilst this has enabled us to better understand knife crime in Essex, the process has consequently inflated the figures. As such, no inferences can be drawn as to the current trend.

Crime Severity Score (CSS) - Based on the ONS Crime Severity Score which replaces the Cambridge Harm Index - data are for the 12 months to May 2020, (a total of 21 crime types have been ranked where scores are available).

The CSS excludes proactively generated crime detection by police i.e. State Based Crime, as these offences do not reliably measure harms experienced by the population. Rather, they measure the resources invested in catching offenders.

ZScore - Standard Score over 1.96 or under -1.96. Standard Scores are used to calculate the probability of an event occurring within a normal distribution; they are also used to compare two scores from different normal distributions (for example the number of offences per police District). In this document, Standard Scores are calculated in the following way: (current month's figure, minus the average figure per month over the previous three years) divided by the Standard Deviation of the same three year period. Standard Deviation is a measure to determine how spread out figures are from the average or "mean" a large standard deviation indicates the data is widely spread; if small, the data will be more clustered together.
