#### **Executive Summary**

- Four of the seven PFCC Priorities for Essex Police have been given a recommended grade of 'Good'. Recommended grades have been determined with reference to comparisons with Essex Police's Most Similar Group (MSG) of forces, internal Key Performance Indicators (KPIs), and professional judgement.
- Three of the seven PFCC priorities 1 (More local, visible and accessible policing), 2 (Crack down on anti-social behaviour) and 4 (Tackling gangs and serious violence) have been given a recommended grade of 'Requires Improvement'.
- All Crime fell by 6.3% for the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019; this equates to 10,552 fewer offences. This decrease has been heavily influenced by the Government's restrictions on gathering and movement in relation to COVID-19. With the recent implementation of some restrictions, crime volumes in October 2020 were lower than those experienced in October 2019: Essex Police recorded 964 fewer offences (-6.8%) in October 2020 compared to October 2019. Each change in the rules relating to social distancing has affected the number of All Crime offences reported to Essex Police.\*
- The number of anti-social behaviour (ASB) incidents was 23.8% higher in October 2020 compared to October 2019 (808 more incidents). The number of ASB incidents has been reducing steadily since May 2020, although October 2020 saw a slight increase compared to September 2020. The general decrease is due to the gradual easing of the Government's restrictions, and activities considered to be anti-social during the lockdown period now being permitted, such as social gatherings. The Government's re-implementation of some restriction of movement in September and October 2020 continues to effect the number of ASB incidents.
- Confidence (independent survey) is at 69.7% (results to the 12 months to June 2020). **Compared to year ending June 2019, confidence in the local police increased by 4.1% points**. Confidence in the local police from the Crime Survey of England and Wales (CSEW) places Essex eighth in its MSG, however, and 6.5% points below the MSG average.
- No crime type was either statistically high or low in the month of October 2020.

Essex experienced a 6.3% decrease in All Crime (10,552 fewer offences) for the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019. Essex is eighth in its Most Similar Group of forces (MSG) for crime per 1,000 population.

This decrease in crime has been heavily influenced by the Government's restrictions on gathering and movement in relation to COVID-19. With the recent implementation of some restrictions, crime volumes in October 2020 are lower to those experienced in October 2019: Essex Police recorded 964 fewer offences (-6.8%) in October 2020 compared to October 2019.

Essex was graded as Outstanding in its recent HMICFRS Crime Data Integrity (CDI) inspection. Essex Police is only the third force of the 41 that have been inspected judged as outstanding on the first visit in this inspection programme.

Confidence (independent survey) is at 69.7% (results to the 12 months to June 2020). Compared to year ending June 2019, confidence in the local police has significantly increased (an improvement of 4.1% points). Confidence in the local police from the Crime Survey of England and Wales (CSEW) places Essex eighth in its MSG, and 6.5% points below the Most Similar Group of Forces (MSG) average. However, the sample size from this survey is not representative at a sufficiently small scale to measure local level results. The Essex Police independent survey (results detailed above) was therefore introduced to achieve a more accurate local measure with only a small margin of error. The results from the Essex Police survey show that the Force performs significantly better on confidence in local policing than the results from the CSEW, which asks the same question.

The All Crime Harm (Crime Severity) Score\* (13.1) places Essex eighth (last) in its MSG.

While Essex Police performance in relation to emergency response attendance within 15 minutes (urban) or 20 minutes (rural) remains below the 80% target for the 12 months to October 2020, it has improved by 7.1 percentage points when compared to the 12 months to October 2019. Essex Police are now only 1.5% points below the 80% target.

Due to the fact that Essex is 8th in its MSG for all comparable metrics and that the emergency response grade of service remains below target, a grade of Requires Improvement is recommended.



Essex experienced a 15.1% increase (6,422 more) in Anti-Social Behaviour (ASB) incidents for the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019. This increase was due to the COVID-19 restriction period, with many additional reports relating to activities that were previously not considered to be ASB, for example social gatherings and shops and businesses continuing to trade. Although ASB also increased by 23.8% in October 2020 compared to October 2019 (808 more incidents), the number of incidents reported has been generally reducing since May 2020, although October saw an increase; this decrease is due to the gradual easing of the Government's restrictions. Due to the Government's re-implementation of some restrictions of movement in September 2020 and October 2020, however, the number of ASB incidents in October 2020 increased compared to the number recorded in September 2020.

ASB Perception (from the Crime Survey of England and Wales) in Essex experienced a 1.0% point increase (decline). Essex is 0.5% points better than the MSG average; this places Essex fourth in its Most Similar Group of forces. The results of Essex's independent survey in relation to how well residents perceive Essex Police and partner organisations to be dealing with ASB showed a significant improvement: 6.6% points.

Due to the rise in ASB and an increase in negative perceptions, a grade of Requires Improvement is recommended.

Essex experienced a 0.1% increase (57 more) in Domestic Abuse incidents and a 3.8% decrease (765 fewer) in repeat incidents of Domestic Abuse for the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019. However, there was a 17.3% increase (2,058 more) in Domestic Abuse arrests and a 36.9% increase (66 more) in Domestic Violence Protection Notices (DVPN) and Protection Orders (DVPO) in the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019.

There was a 14.0% increase (431 more) in the number of solved Domestic Abuse outcomes in the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019.

Due to the decrease in repeat incidents of Domestic Abuse and the increase in Domestic Abuse offences solved, a grade of Good is recommended.

## **Priority 4 – Tackling gangs and serious violence**

Essex saw a decrease of 43 homicides (to 19 offences) for the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019. The 12 months to October 2019 includes the tragic incident where 39 Vietnamese nationals were discovered in a lorry trailer in Grays in October 2019. Essex is eighth in its Most Similar Group (MSG) of forces for offences per 1,000 population, and is higher than the MSG average.

There was a 5.3% decrease (812 fewer offences) in Violence with Injury offences. Essex is fourth in its MSG for offences per 1,000 population, and is slightly better than the MSG average. There is also an increase in domestic abuse related Violence with Injury (6.3% decrease, 337 more offences); 39.5% of Violence with Injury is domestic abuse-related.

## **Priority 4 – Tackling gangs and serious violence**

The combined harm (Crime Severity) score\* (7.8) for Violence with Injury, Rape, Other Sexual Offences and Robbery of Personal Property places Essex eighth in its Most Similar Group of Forces (MSG).

There was a 6.7% increase (191 more) in the number of solved high harm offences (Violence with Injury, Rape, Other Sexual Offences and Robbery of Personal Property combined) in the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019. This is being driven by an increase in the number of Rape and Other Sexual Offences solved. Please see page 17 for the numbers of solved for each category.

There was a 24.3% increase (619 more) in the number of stop and search for weapons in the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019. This is a result of both increased police proactivity and improvements in technology.

There was a 40.1% increase (400 more) in the number of Knife-enabled crime offences in the 12 months to October 2020\*\* compared to the 12 months to October 2019.


Due to the fact that Essex is above the MSG average for Homicide and high harm offences a grade of Requires Improvement is recommended.


#### Please note:

- \* Crime Severity Scores (as calculated by the Office for National Statistics) measure the 'relative harm' of crimes by taking into account both their volume and their severity. Data are for the 12 months to August 2020.
- \*\* The number of knife crime offences is an indicator of how effective Essex Police is at identifying knife-enabled offences, and is not necessarily reflective of the number of these offences that have been committed in the county. This is because the identification of these offences is reliant on the appropriate indicator being manually added to the crime record. A manual review of knife flags was conducted and missing flags were added retrospectively. Additionally a new data quality process was introduced in June 2020. Whilst this has enabled us to better understand knife crime in Essex, the process has consequently inflated the figures. As such, no inferences can be drawn as to the current trend.

98 Organised Crime Group (OCG) disruptions were conducted in Essex in January to July 2020\* inclusive compared with 47 in the same months in 2019 (51 more). In January 2019 there was a change in the way in which the number of OCG disruptions were counted; this follows National Crime Agency (NCA) and Eastern Region Special Operations Unit (ERSOU) guidance to ensure that all forces record disruptions in the same way. Year-on-year comparisons can only therefore be made from January 2020.


Trafficking of drug arrests, which are also as a result of police proactivity, increased by 10.3% (183 more) for the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019. In the same period, 30.1% more trafficking of drugs offences have been recorded (262 more offences to 1,132).


Due to the increase in Trafficking of Drug Arrests, a grade of Good is recommended.


#### Please note:

\* The number of Organised Crime Group disruptions are a comparison of January to July 2019 and January to July 2020, as there was a change in the method by which these disruptions were counted from January 2019. Please note that there is currently a backlog in the recording of disruptions onto police systems; disruptions conducted between February to July 2020 that were not previously recorded in previous reports have since been added. Also due to 9 these delays, data for August is not yet available.

Although there was a 1.7% decrease (36 fewer) in the number of Child Sexual Abuse/Exploitation investigations in the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019, there was a 40.1% increase (99 more) in the number of solved Child Abuse Outcomes in the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019.


11.0% more Child Abuse offences (an additional 549) were recorded in the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019. There was a 1.3% point increase in the solved rate (from 5.0% to 6.3%).

58 Modern Slavery referrals were made in April to October 2020\* compared with 71 in the same months in 2019 (13 fewer).

Due to the fact that the number of child abuse outcomes has increased by 40.1% a grade of Good is recommended.

\*The number of Modern Slavery referrals made to the National Referral Model are a comparison of April to October 2019 and April to October 2020, due to a change in the method of recording in April 2019.

There was a 7.6% decrease (65 fewer) in the numbers of those Killed or Seriously Injured (KSI) in Essex for the 12 months to October 2020 compared to the 12 months to October 2019. Please note that most KSIs do not result in criminal offences (such as death or serious injury caused by dangerous driving) being recorded. Essex is placed fifth in its Most Similar Group (MSG) of forces for casualties per 100 million vehicle kilometres (results to June 2019).

There was a 20.1% increase (717 more offences) in drink/drug driving, particularly drug drive offences recorded between April and October 2020 (during the COVID-19 restriction period). This is a measure of police proactivity in relation to road safety.

As of June 2019, Essex was slightly worse than the MSG average per 100 million km. However, due to the fact that more recent national figures have not been released, the current position cannot be determined (the date of the next national release has not yet been confirmed). Due to the decrease in KSIs by over 10% in the past 12 months, a grade of Good is recommended.

\*No comparison data is currently available for driving offences related to mobile phones due to a legal appeal (which occurred in October 2019). The current phone use legislation is awaiting clarification in the courts; this has been delayed due to the impact of COVID-19.

#### **COVID-19: Restrictions of movement and social distancing**

Since 13 March 2020, the Government implemented a series of alert levels and steps regarding the level of social distancing allowed in relation to COVID-19. Each change has affected the number of All Crime offences recorded.

#### **COVID-19: Restrictions of movement and social distancing**

#### Officers arrest 19 and seize £100k

Weapons, cash and drugs were seized during an operation targeting a network suspected of supplying cocaine to county lines drugs gangs. The arrests were the culmination of a complex investigation into a network of individuals suspected of feeding the drugs market by supplying cocaine to county lines gangs. Taking out these links in the chain also helps to protect vulnerable adults and children who these criminals exploit and use for their own financial gain.

Crime Severity Score (CSS) - Based on the ONS Crime Severity Score which replaces the Cambridge Harm Index - data are for the 12 months to August 2020, (a total of 21 crime types have been ranked where scores are available).

The CSS excludes proactively generated crime detection by police i.e. State Based Crime, as these offences do not reliably measure harms experienced by the population. Rather, they measure the resources invested in catching offenders.

Yr on Yr 1m %/% pt. diff. - compares the month of October 2020 with the month of October 2019.

Yr on Yr 3m %/% pt. diff. - compares the three months to October 2020 with the three months to October 2019.

**Z Score** - Standard Score over 1.96. Standard Scores are used to calculate the probability of an event occurring within a normal distribution; they are also used to compare two scores from different normal distributions (for example the number of offences per police District). In this document, a long and a score are calculated in the following way: (current month's figure, minus the average figure per month over the previous three years) divided by the Standard Deviation of the same three year period. Standard Deviation is a measure to determine how spread out figures are from the average or "mean" a large standard deviation indicates the data is widely spread; if small, the data will be more clustered together.
