1. Purpose of the report

- 1.1. To seek approval to allocate £370,449 in the form of grants from the Violence & Vulnerability Community Safety (VVCS) Grants Programme (2021 2023) to the organisations listed in section 4 below.
- 1.2. These grants to community projects will:
 - protect vulnerable people from exploitation by gangs and intervene early to help steer them towards a successful life
 - work with people vulnerable to being groomed to help them avoid or step away from criminal lifestyles
 - contribute to reducing serious violence in various locations across Essex and with multiple vulnerable groups.
 - impact on one or more of the issues identified through the listening projects the Violence and Vulnerability Partnership undertook in 2020/21.
 - be delivered between 1st January 2022 to 31st March 2023.
- 1.3. As agreed in decision 108/21 (9th August 2021), £250,000 is available for awards to local not for profit groups from the 'Violence & Vulnerability Community Safety' (VVCS) Grants Programme (2021 2023). These funds are made up of £150,000 from V&V Joint Budget, and £100,000 from Community Safety Development Fund.
- 1.4. In addition, based on the number and quality of applications received, it is recommended to increase the available amount for awards to local not for profit groups, from £250,000 to £370,449. The extra £120,449 will be provided from the 2021-22 Essex Violence & Vulnerability Joint Budget.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1. Approve the additional element of £120,449 from the Essex Violence & Vulnerability Joint Budget to make the total amount allocated through the VVCS Grant Programme £370,449.
- 2.2. Approve the allocation of the VVCS grant to local organisations as listed under section 4.6.

3. Benefits of the proposal

3.1. Organisations have been recommended for approval that contribute to having a positive impact on reducing the risk of exploitation of young or vulnerable people by gangs and reducing serious violence. The projects will also help tackle the issues identified through the listening projects the Violence and Vulnerability Partnership undertook in 2020/21.

4. Background and proposal

- 4.1. The PFCC and county Violence & Vulnerability Partnership invited applications from not-for-profit local organisations who work with children, young people, young adults and families and who have a proven track record of having a positive impact on issues relating to serious violence, exploitation and that respond to one or more of the issues identified through the Violence and Vulnerability listening projects undertaken in 2020/21 (as noted below under point 4.2).
- 4.2. The issues identified as priorities through the V&V listening projects are summarised below:
 - Targeted youth work aimed at those young people most at risk of exploitation
 - Increased mental health support for young people at risk of serious violence
 - Support for victims of youth violence
 - Indoor/ outdoor safe spaces with affordable and inclusive activities for young people to socialise
 - Opportunities for young people to learn life skills, participate in community based or volunteering work
 - Work with young people and their families to raise awareness of youth violence
 - Projects that promote greater communication and positive engagement between the police, youth groups and schools.
- 4.3. 51 applications were received totalling £884,276
- 4.4. Applications were reviewed by panels of stakeholders, as set out below:
 - Violence and Vulnerability Partnership 'Voice of Communities' group, with a range of voluntary sector organisations.
 - Panels of 'young commissioners' drawn from members of the Young Essex Assembly.
 - Multi-agency panel with representatives from the PFCC, Essex Violence and Vulnerability Unit, Southend, Essex and Thurrock Councils, Essex Community Foundation and Active Essex.

- 4.5. The panels reviewed the applications and assessed the activity, including that it did not duplicate or compete with existing activity.
- 4.6. The evaluation panels have recommended 21 organisations for funding totalling £370,449

The Children's Society	To support the development of an early intervention referral pathway and group work programme for young people who are stopped and searched and are found to be in possession of cannabis (and not covered by current provision). With an offer to the young people referred into the service a one to one assessment to understand their life as they experience it as well as identify barriers to engagement: and participation in group sessions. For the sessions to focus on and allow the young people to explore: associated risks and consequences and the health impacts of cannabis use; physically and mentally; harm reduction methods and ways to stop the use of cannabis, including advice on diversionary activities; peer pressure/grooming behaviours – what forms these can come in.	£20,000
The Wilderness Foundation	Providing wilderness therapy, aspects of counselling along with environment-focused activities, centred around a nature-based experience. 5. Alternative options considered and rejected

5.1. The PFCC could choose to award funding to alternative projects however the organisations listed in section 4 were assessed in line with the published criteria and by evaluation panels. The PFCC may opt not to increase the available funding for the grant but we believe the projects listed in section 4 are of a good quality, will deliver positive outcomes, and all meet the criteria of the fund making them worthy of the partnership's support.

6. Police and Crime Plan

6.1. This fund will support organisations working with the Essex Violence and Vulnerability partnership, enabling partner organisations to support the priorities within the Police and Crime Plan, in particular protecting children and vulnerable people from harm.

7. Police operational implications

7.1. There are no operational implications.

8. Financial implications

- 8.1. The Community Safety Development Fund (CSDF), held by the PFCC office, has a budget of £300,000 allocated for Community Safety projects. £100,000 is being utilised for the VVCS Grants Programme (2021 2023).
- 8.2. The Essex Violence & Vulnerability Joint Budget is made up of funding the PFCC has received from the Home Office as part of a successful bid to the VRU Fund (£1,160,000), a contribution from Essex County Council (£500,000) and investment from the PFCC's Community Safety Fund (£200,000). For £270,449 from this fund to be utilised for the VVCS Grants Programme.
- 8.3. Funding is to be used by 31st March 2023. Any underspend must be returned to the PFCC office.

9. Legal implications

- 9.1. To ensure funding is awarded responsibly, and that it will be of good value to taxpayers', due diligence has been conducted on each recommended applicant that includes:
 - Finance check ensuring there are no irregularities within accounts that have been submitted and show sound financial health and a positive cash position
 - Social media/news search
 - Review check against Companies' House and the Charity Commission (where applicable)
 - Review of governing documents including review of trustees, board and committee members
 - Robustness and likely effectiveness and efficiency of the application
 - Sustainability of the organisation without this funding
 - The PFCC may seek the views of key partner agencies to qualify any statements or statistics quoted within an application e.g. Police, local authority and strategic commissioned providers.
 - Robust safeguarding procedures in place
 - Robust GDPR processes in place
- 9.2. The award of the grant is subject to the PFCC's standard funding agreement.

10. Staffing implications

10.1. There are no staffing implications.

11. Equality and Diversity implications

11.1. Every applicant described their target audience, evidence of need and how they will make their project accessible within the application. All support services are available and accessible to all. Some are tailored specifically to groups that do not typically engage in traditional services, increasing the likelihood of positive engagement. Each organisation will be required to record who uses the service so we can assess the impact of each project on different elements of the community. A full Equality Impact Assessment has been undertaken and is available on request.

12. Risks

12.1. With any grant funding there is a risk to the PFCC that the organisations do not deliver against expected outputs. This risk is low and within appetite as the

- successful organisations listed in section 4 have gone through a due diligence and evaluation process.
- 12.2. All services identified in section 4 have demonstrated the need and the requirement for this funding. There is a risk that funding will not be utilised by the end March 2023, though this has been mitigated by a robust assessment process and by making it clear to organisations that unspent funding must be returned.

13. Governance Boards

- 13.1. All applications have been considered, assessed, and recommended for funding via the evaluation panels held in November 2021.
- 13.2. The work supported by the grants awarded to these small organisations will be reported to the Violence and Vulnerability partnership, and delivery will be overseen by the workstream, 'voice of communities'.
