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1. Executive Summary

1.1. This report seeks to gain approval for the allocation of £213,575 in community grants via the 2022-23 Crime Prevention Fund to the organisations listed in section 4 below.

2. Recommendations

2.1. That the PFCC approves the allocation of £213,575 to local organisations, allowing them to deliver a variety of community projects that will help prevent crime and make communities safer, in accordance with the Police and Crime Plan.

3. Background to the Proposal

3.1. The Commissioner opened the Crime Prevention Fund for applications from local voluntary and community safety groups to fund projects which prevent crime from happening, reduce overall crime and keep our communities safer.

- Crime Prevention is one of the priorities in the PFCC's Police and Crime Plan. 62 applications were received for this fund, totalling £897,480.
- 3.2. Applications were evaluated by a panel of local stakeholders, which included representatives from Essex Police, the Essex Community Foundation, the PFCC, and a representative for the Community Safety Partnerships. The panel reviewed applications to ensure that:
 - Projects met the criteria of the Fund
 - Projects did not duplicate, interfere with, or compete with existing activity
 - Applications demonstrated how they would be sustained after funding ended
- 3.3. Out of the 62 applications, the evaluation panel recommend 16 organisations for funding totalling £213,575. The list of successful organisations, the value of their allocation and their geographical reach is broken down in the table below:

4. Proposal and Associated Benefits

- 4.1. The purpose of the Crime Prevention Fund is to deliver programmes and services that focus on the prevention of crime and building safer communities. This fund will help to reinforce delivery of the prevention priority within the PFCC's Police and Crime Plan.
- 4.2. Through the Crime Prevention Fund, £200,000 will be distributed to support local voluntary and community safety groups to deliver activity aligned with the Police and Crime Plan.
- 4.3. The Crime Prevention Fund was launched alongside the new Police and Crime Plan and Crime Prevention Strategy, enhancing the engagement activity and promoting the new Police and Crime Plan priorities.

5. Options Analysis

5.1. The Commissioner has committed to providing funding through the Crime Prevention Fund to support community projects which support crime prevention activity. The PFCC could choose to award funding to alternative projects, however the organisations listed in section 4 were felt to be those that best met the priorities of the Police and Crime Plan and the Crime Prevention Fund criteria when assessed by the evaluation panel.

6. Consultation and Engagement

6.1. The opportunity to access this funding was communicated externally via the PFCC's website, newsletters and social media. The PFCC also used a variety of partnership forums to raise awareness of the opportunity including the Essex Community Safety Network. The volume of responses demonstrates the effectiveness of this communication and engagement exercise.

7. Strategic Links

- 7.1. This funding will enable community organisations to support the priorities in the Police and Crime Plan, particularly *Further Investment in Crime Prevention*.
- 7.2. Whilst crime prevention should remain the core priority for these projects, many organisations also support other priorities in the Police and Crime Plan, including:
 - Protecting vulnerable people and breaking the cycle of domestic abuse
 - Encouraging volunteers and community support
 - Improving support for victims of crime
 - Reducing drug driven violence
- 7.3. This funding also supports the priorities in the Crime Prevention Strategy 2021-25 including knife crime, domestic abuse, and mental health.

8. Police operational implications

8.1. There are no direct operational implications on Essex Police.

9. Financial implications

9.1. The PFCC will allocate up to £213,575 in grants to the organisations identified in section 4. £200,000 of this funding will be allocated from the Crime Prevention Fund with the remaining £13,575 being allocated from the 2022-23 Community Safety Development Fund. These are one-off grants.

10. Legal implications

10.1. These grants are subject to the PFCC's standard grant agreement, which has recently been reviewed and updated to ensure its continued fitness for purpose.

11. Staffing implications

- 11.1. The PFCC will be required to monitor and track the use of this funding and will want to work with successful bidders to undertake communications and media activities to highlight the impact of these initiatives.
- 11.2. Employment of staff or sessional workers by successful bidders will be the responsibility of that organisation. Our funding agreement states that this is one-off grant funding and the PFCC has no liability for the ongoing costs of any roles established using this funding.

12. Equality, Diversity, and Inclusion implications

12.2. The criteria and evaluation process seek to address any potential adverse impacts on those with protected characteristics. Due to the nature of the fund, there may be some deliberate differential impacts on some protected groups, e.g., in the case of projects that address violence against women and girls, this may mean the project delivery and accessibility criteria are tailored towards a certain cohort.

13. Risks and Mitigations

13.1. The use of a panel of local partners ensures there is external support and a diverse range of opinions represented when evaluating the applications.

- 13.2. Following the due diligence process, some risk has been identified regarding the financial results of a number of the organisations over the last two years, largely due to the uncertain impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, with financial results skewed by government grants and furlough. To mitigate against these risks and limit any possible loss of PFCC funding, it is proposed that we provide the funding quarterly in advance and, where the risk appears greater, as it does for a small number, we provide the funding monthly in advance.
- 13.3. The due diligence process has also identified a small number of policies for some organisations that are either not dated or not extensive enough. We will request additional information regarding these policies as part of making the awards to the relevant organisations. The award will then be subject to the policies being appropriately reviewed and updated if required.
- 13.4. There is also a risk that the funding allocated is not utilised as intended. We use our funding agreement to mitigate this risk. Effective monitoring of these projects will ensure that any issues are flagged early and can be dealt with appropriately.

14. Governance Boards

14.1. This funding was discussed at the PFCC's Senior Management Team meeting on 15th February and at the Management Team meeting on 1st March 2022.

15. Links to Future Plans

15.1. This is one-off grant funding and not linked to any specific future plans other than continued delivery of the Police and Crime Plan.
