Redesigning support for perpetrators and victims of Domestic Abuse

1.1 Request for Quotation – guidance and instructions

Essex County Council invites you to submit a quotation for this requirement by email.

This RFQ comprises:

- Pricing

In consideration of the opportunity to participate in email RFQ's held and conducted by Essex County Council ("Authority"), your company ("Invitee") agrees to the following terms and conditions:

- **A.** The Authority reserves the right to amend, modify or withdraw the email RFQ. The Authority reserves the right to accept or reject all or part of your proposal. The Authority is not liable for any costs incurred by the Invitee in the preparation, presentation, or any other aspect of the Invitee's bid. The Authority will not reimburse any expense incurred by you in preparing your bid. Invitees take part in this e-mail RFQ entirely at their own risk and cost.
- **B**. All quotes which the Invitee submits through the email RFQ are legally valid quotations without qualification, except for data entry errors. All rates and prices quoted must exclude VAT and must be in sterling.
- **C**. The Invitee shall keep the email RFQ content, other confidential materials provided by the Site and/or the Authority, and all bids provided by the Invitee or another participating organisation in confidence and shall not disclose the foregoing to any third party.
- **D**. The Invitee should ensure that they read and digest all of the required actions and appropriate deadlines and any subsequent communications.

2. Research design specification

The requirements for this specification are set out below. Please read the document in full before completing your quotation.

2.1 Title

Designing systemic support for perpetrators, victims, and survivors of domestic abuse.

2.2 Summary

The Southend, Essex and Thurrock Domestic Abuse Board (SETDAB) brings together relevant partners from across the local authority's health, social care, education, public health, criminal justice and police system with the purpose of preventing, reducing and responding to domestic abuse.

Descriptors and indicators of domestic abuse are inclusive of if the behaviour consists of a single incident or a course of conduct, and applies to any person 16+

- Physical or sexual abuse
- Violent or threatening behaviour
- Controlling or coercive behaviour
- Economic abuse
- Psychological, emotional or other abuse
- Intimate Partner Violence
- Abuse by Family Members
- Teenage Relationship Abuse
- Adolescent to Parent Violence and Abuse

The support that is currently available has developed piecemeal over several years across with funding made available from a range of partners to support the reduction of and response to domestic abuse.

The advent of the <u>2021 Domestic Abuse Duties</u> and the grant funding commitments from DLUC and the Home Office, this presents an opportunity to re-think the design and delivery of pathways to support and for perpetrators and victims of domestic abuse.

In addition to the work of <u>SETDAB</u> itself, there are links with a range of other partnership boards, strategies and plans across the partnerships which are inextricably linked to domestic abuse and these are:

- 1 SET wide Essex Violence and Vulnerability Board
- 2 Safer Essex and 13x local Community Safety Partnership
- 3. Southend, Essex and Thurrock Sexual Violence and Abuse Strategy
- 4. Thurrock Violence Against Women and Girls Strategy

The partnership has an ambition to ensure early help is designed into the heart of our response to domestic abuse, and where direct support and intervention is needed, that it is designed in a systemic way that offers holistic support to those who need it across the three local authority areas of Southend, Essex and Thurrock (SET).

Each commissioning partner has aligned their perpetrator and victims support contracts to end March 2024 so that we can maximise this opportunity for systemic change through integrated design and commissioning.

The work will commence in June and be delivered by October 2022 giving sufficient time for system change to occur by March 2024

2.3 Background to the issue

Essex County Council is acting as lead commissioner to secure a research and design partner for this work and is acting on behalf of Thurrock and Southend Unitary Authorities, the Police and Crime Commissioner and the Essex Police. The work itself will benefit all partners across the SET area working to prevent and reduce the impacts of domestic abuse.

The combined population of the set area SET is 1,787,100 and there are diverse needs and issues across boundaries. Whilst Southend and Thurrock are unitary authorities with responsibility for all council-based services, including housing, Essex County is a two-tier authority and as such works closely with the 12 local district/borough councils over a large and diverse geography.

There is a high prevalence of domestic abuse in Essex (see each local authority needs assessments) and this design work is intended to support some on the long-term ambitions of the SETDAB Partnership and each local authority area as set out in existing strategies, but specifically the improvement the support to perpetrators, victims and Survivors

- SETDAB Strategy
- Essex CC Strategy
- Thurrock Strategy
- Southend Strategy

2.4 Research objectives

The purpose of this work is to complete a design exercise that focuses specifically on understanding better how, as a complex system across the SET area we can identify collectively

- a) What we doing well and what should we stop doing?
- b) What are the pathways to support and are they fit for purpose?
- c) What processes are in place to identify and support perpetrators/victims/survivors?*
- d) What support is available to victims and survivors and how effective is it?

- c) What support is available for perpetrators and how effective is it?
- e) How might we identify perpetrators and victims earlier in our work?
- f) What are the opportunities to work together to design our offer together and differently?

2.5 Target participant group

The outputs of the work will be to the benefit of perpetrators, victims and survivors of domestic abuse; to improve outcomes but also to reduce the increasingly high-risk incidents of domestic abuse across the 3 local authority areas.

The partners to be included in this work include

- Police Fire and Crime Commissioner,
- Southend, Essex and Thurrock Commissioners,
- Public Health,
- Police,
- Probation,
- Housing Authorities
- Service providers e.g., health, adult and children social care, voluntary sector
- Perpetrators
- Providers of domestic abuse services and training
- Victims and survivors of domestic abuse*

There is commitment from all partners to this work to ensure there is the level of engagement from the respective organisations to participate in and contribute to it and we will all use our extensive networks and contacts to support any engagement requirements.

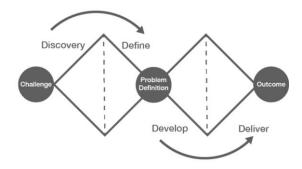

We anticipate there will need to be engagement with between 250-350 stakeholders across the three local authority areas which you are expected to outline in your proposals a range of methods for doing so.

2.6 Suggested approach and analysis

The partnership is familiar with the "double diamond" methodology and is looking for the same or similar approach that enables us to reach a good design solution by challenging what we know, understand what more we need to know, iterate new approaches (or confirm current ones) and ultimately to have a joined up, potentially integrated approach to pathways to support and a system support offer for victims of domestic abuse.

There is already available an extensive library of recent qualitative, quantitative and research data that will be available and this would form the foundation of the discovery.

2.7 Outputs

The design steering group require regular reports aligned to timelines aligned to the work and as set out by the design partner. Information should be presented in easily accessible formats that inform partners and our "Victims Voices fora"

- Current status of the work
- Findings to date
- Challenges
- Risks
- Financial update

2.8 Liaison arrangements

The successful organisation will be expected to liaise with the Essex County Council Lead Commissioner for domestic abuse and be part of and report to the project steering group of which will be made up of multiagency representatives. This should be factored into your delivery plan timelines as to how frequently you would determine is needed.

Reporting by way of updates and recommendations at key stages of the work will be to the 3 Local Domestic Abuse Partnership Boards and the SETDAB and this will be a total of 8 meetings with 30-minute slots over the period of the project.

Any reports, proposals and recommendations can be presented in mixed media which should be factored into your financial proposals
