



Key Findings

Essex Police is not a Home Office "Outlier" for any of the measures with outlier criteria in place, namely Homicide, Serious Violence and Neighbourhood Crime.

Crime levels remain significantly below the volumes statistically forecast for Burglary, Robbery, Theft from Person and Vehicle offences.

Overall, performance is improving or stable which is no change compared to last quarter.

Additional points of note:

- There has been an increase in Homicide compared to the previous year and the baseline year.
- Improvements in Crime Data Accuracy (CDA) has led to increases in the recording of knife-enabled crime.
- The number of offences involving discharge of a Firearm have increased compared to the previous year and baseline year.
- Violence With Injury Offences have increased compared to the previous year and baseline year. Violence with injury meets two out of four outlier criteria, an increase in the number of offences vs the baseline year and an increase in the last six months v. the same six months last year.
- The number of VAWG Offences have increased compared to the previous year and the baseline year.
- The number of Drug Crime Offences have increased compared to the baseline year.
- Essex is above the MSG average for Robbery and Theft Of and From a Vehicle offences for crimes per 1,000 population but does not feature as an Outlier for neighbourhood crime.
- The number of businesses experiencing a cyber crime attack has increased compared to the previous year and baseline year.







(proxy measure for: Hospital admissions of u25s for assault with a sharp object)































Reduce neighbourhood crime: Theft from Person








Reduce neighbourhood crime: Vehicle Offences





% of Victims satisfied with the service they received








Q13b Taking everything into account, how good a job do you think the police in this area are doing?





- The gap between victim and non-victim satisfaction is narrowing.

Repeat is a measure of whether the same victim has any previous crime recorded in the past year - excludes crimes recorded on the same day when identifying repeat status.


One in three victims are repeats. They will have reported more than one crime to Essex Police in the previous year.

There is little difference (0.4% point) in the repeat rate for High Harm offences and Volume Crime offences.





Tackle Cyber Crime: Confidence in the law enforcement response to cyber crime (proxy data from SMSR independent survey)




52% of respondents reported that they think Essex Police are doing a Good/Excellent job.

Tackle Cyber Crime: Number of businesses experiencing a cyber breach or attack (proxy data from Athena Crime)






In August 2022, Essex Police achieved **compliance of 78.1% for the proportion of calls answered within 10 seconds** v. 70.4% for the National average.
