1. Executive Summary

1.1. The existing anti-fraud and anti-bribery policy is part of the PFCC Constitution and requires updating. The attached revision is referred to as "the anti-fraud and anti-bribery commitment".

2. Recommendations

2.1. That the PFCC approves and adopts the anti-fraud and anti-bribery commitment attached at Appendix 1.

3. Background to the Proposal

- 3.1. The PFCC and Essex Police promote a zero-tolerance approach towards fraud, bribery, and other malpractice for personal gain. To that extent, dishonesty, lack of integrity, avoidance of controls and failure to comply with agreed policies will not be tolerated.
- 3.2. The Anti-Fraud and Anti-Bribery Policy was last reviewed in 2019 and was subsequently considered by the Joint Audit Committee at its meeting on 22 March 2019.
- 3.3. The policy has been updated to the anti-fraud and anti-bribery commitment and is supported by the wider governance framework and the following interrelated policies, procedures, and regulations:

4. Proposal and Associated Benefits

4.1. The anti-fraud and anti-bribery commitment is key to promoting a strong ethical and counter fraud culture.

5. Options Analysis

5.1. We could decide not to update the 2019 policy, however it is due to be updated and there are a number of policies that it overlaps with, which the previous policy does not acknowledge.

6. Consultation and Engagement

6.1 The anti-fraud and anti-bribery commitment has been drawn up in consultation with the Deputy Chief Constable for Essex Police and the internal auditors.

7. Strategic Links

7.1 The PFCC's budget is invested to help support the achievement of the objectives outlined in the Police and Crime Plan. The anti-fraud and anti-bribery commitment will assist with keeping the PFCC's funds secure.

8.1 There are no direct operational implications arising from the approval, adoption and publication of this commitment.

9.1 There are no direct financial implications, however this commitment will help to safeguard the funds and assets of the PFCC
